TROLLEY UPDATES

Two new Pigeon Forge trolleys featuring a mountain-scape design were recently unveiled, and as new vehicles are introduced into the fleet, each will feature an image of a Smoky Mountains sunset. With a recordbreaking ridership of more than 3.1 million in the 2018-2019 season, our transit system is now the second largest rural transit system in the U.S.

As a reminder, Pigeon Forge residents and those who work in the city may purchase a year-round pass (\$35 per person), a \$3 one-day pass, a \$1 North or South Parkway ticket as well as tickets for additional route options at the Pigeon Forge Trolley Office located in the Old Mill district at traffic light seven. (There is no charge for children ages three and under.)

Broady Dairy



Dr. Robert A. Broady, a practicing Sevier County physician from 1937 to 1983, began a dairy farm near traffic light #10 in the 1940s with one half-breed Jersey cow. He purchased the cow from a family whose child was suffering from diphtheria. The sale provided money for the child's immediate treatment at Knoxville General Hospital. Before long others began paying Dr. Broady for treatment with cows. However, he never accepted a family's only milk cow. Instead, he

would ask for a calf the following spring. By 1952, Broady's Ayrshire dairy herd had the best record for quantity of milk produced in the Southeast. Broady Dairy milk was sold to plants in Knoxville, served in the hospital Dr. Broady opened, and was sold to local residents for fifty cents a gallon. The more affordable milk available to Sevier County residents meant less likelihood of rickets, a disorder caused by vitamin D deficiency.

Prior to their dairy farming Dr. Broady, along with his nurse and wife Ellen, did mission work in China for five years in the early 1930s. They saw more than 50,000 patients during that time. They were able to leave before World War II began and relocated to Ellen's home – Sevier County. After initially practicing medicine in an office above Wade's Department Store in downtown Sevierville, the Broadys opened a hospital in 1940 in downtown Sevierville. Together, they helped deliver more than 7,100 Sevier County babies throughout their nearly 50 years in practice. Their half decade of service left a lasting impact on the people of China and Sevier County.
